Beaverhill Bird Observatory Update: August 29 to September 4, 2005

It has been another busy week at the BBO. With Sara our summer staff person finishing on the 31st I was concerned I would be all alone running the nets for both owls and songbirds. This however has not been the case. I've had lots of volunteers help from Martina Frey, Cory Olsen, Chuck and Gill Priestley, as well as visitors coming to check out what birds are migrating through. We had another solid week of banding, good numbers of birds each day. To compare to last year at this time, we had 937 birds since August 1 and in 2004 we had only 550. Our Myrtle and Tennessee Warblers are way up from last years



totals at this time, while our Redstarts are still down. Our busiest day was August 29 when we captured 86 birds!
