Weekly Update July 30th to August 5th, 2016

Every day was certainly action packed, but some highlights include teaching the workshoppers to handle, extract, and band birds, talks by myself (Emily), Gerald Romanchuk, Geoff Holroyd, Gord Court, butterfly adventuring with Loney and Dave, visting the Trefry's and their Peregrine's, banding Purple Martin chicks and Ruby-throated Hummingbirds, and canoeing on Islet Lake followed by a steak dinner (and remember, that's just the highlights!). All in all, the workshop was beneficial to all involved and will hopefully be an annual event. Special thanks to all guest presenters and supervisors (Jeff Manchuk and Daniel Verhoeff), Irene for her baking skills, and especially to Geoff and Helen for their stellar organizational and hosting abilities.

During this workshop, we also continued our migration monitoring program and MAPS. We are just starting to notice the first few true migrants such as Black and White Warbler and Myrtle Warbler. While the volume of birds may not be very high, these few birds remind us that the craziness of fall migration will soon be upon us. Another cool catch from migration was a LeConte's sparrow, which can be heard out in the dry lakebed, but never seem to come close enough to find themselves in a net. MAPS has also yielded some interesting catches including Marsh Wrens, Northern Waterthrush, and a very confused young Grebe who we found on the trail.
