Sara, Geoff Holroyd, and Jeremy all worked hard to get the lab set-up in preparation for the start of spring migration monitoring on May 1st. The first week of banding has been slow due to some snowy/cold weather. However, we have already caught 13 different species which includes a Myrtle/Audubon hybrid Warbler, many sparrows (White-throated, Lincoln's, Savannah, and Song Sparrows), Orange-crowned Warblers, Hermit Thrushes, and Dark-eyed Juncos are among the variety.

Over the past week, staff, volunteers, and board members have been busy checking our Northern Saw-whet Owl boxes for nesting owls,

repairing Tree Swallow nest boxes, re-painting numbers on Tree Swallow nest boxes, cleaning/organizing the lab, constructing new bunkbeds for Raven's Roost, and clearing trails. Needless to say we had a busy first week out at the BBO.

Further, with the help of Laurie Hunt; BBO hosted intern orientation day on May 5th. We are excited to have 11 student interns join us for the summer working on a range of projects from Bats, Tree Swallows, House Wrens, Butterflies, and Breeding Bird Surveys.
