Beaverhill Bird Observatory Weekly Update June 20th - 29th, 2019

This week staff struggled to get all the MAPS banding done in time due to the continuous rainstorms and high winds that have been plaguing Alberta. With a little bit of luck though, and some help from our volunteers, we managed to get all the banding in!

Highlights from MAPS this week include banding several cedar waxwings and a ruby-crowned kinglet at our SOPO station. When staff weren't banding at MAPS, in the afternoons they were able to band Tree Swallow chicks, between the pockets of thunderstorms, fix nest boxes, patch mist nets and conduct nest searches throughout the natural area. A number of new nests were located including Least Flycatcher nests and American Robin nests. Due to all the wet and windy weather, staff were also able to get caught up on office tasks including; data entry, R coding analysis, creating new promotional posters, and doing band inventory.
