Beaverhill Bird Observatory Weekly Update

July 30th- August 10th, 2019

These past ten days have been jammed pack full of fun, adventures, young ornithologists (YO) and of course BIRDS! Highlight captures on migration have included a Blue-headed Vireo, a couple of Philadelphia Vireos, Tennessee Warblers, and a Yellow-bellied Flycatcher. On MAPS, highlight captures included, a Marsh Wren, a Swamp Sparrow, two Northern Waterthrushes and a juvenile Sora!!

At the beginning of the week staff were busy with data entry, patching nets, bird bag laundry, re-installing a Northern Saw-whet Owl nest box that had fallen due to beaver activity, and completed a vegetation survey for MAPS at our SOPO station. Staff also have been actively trying to live trap some skunks that took up residence under the BBO lab, so we can relocate them to a new location, as we don't want anyone to be sprayed!

However, they finally decided to leave on their own, Yay! After the skunks left, staff dug a trench around the lab and installed new wire around the base of the building to try and prevent anymore wildlife from living under the building. Later in the week staff began preparing for hosting the young ornithologist workshop. We set up the event tents, mowed the clearing, swept and cleaned the lab among some other tasks. The young ornithologists arrived in the late afternoon on August 4th!

The workshop was held from August 4th to August 10th. It was a very full week with 9 YO's staying with staff in the woods. Throughout the week we had Butterfly Biologist David Laurie visit, Geoff Holroyd gave a Tree Swallow presentation and took the YO's out to the malaise trap and Geoff led the YO's through hummingbird banding. Helen and Phil Trefry hosted the YO's at their place one evening and gave a falconry tour where the YO's were able to

meet many different birds of prey. Kim from WILDNorth also came that evening to explain wildlife rehab and released ducklings with the YO's. Further Dr. Gord Court, a Species at Risk Biologist, brought a Great Grey Owl and gave an Owls of AB presentation to all the YO's. At the end of the

week staff with Geoff and Helen took the YO's on a big birding day throughout the local area and they were able to see a total of 112 bird species!!!! Needless to say it was an amazing week

and a HUGE thank you goes out to Helen Trefry who organized the entire workshop including

all the meals and activities! A big thank you to Geoff Holroyd who also brought out his water truck for the week and led many activities.

During the YO workshop we completed our final round of MAPS. Despite the rainy weather throughout the summer we still managed to capture 640 birds on MAPS which is our highest number of captures on MAPS yet! Migration monitoring has still been slow, but hopefully as we get closer to the end of the month, we will start catching more diversity including the lovely warblers.
