## Weekly Update August 23 – 30, 2021

The week began with a thorough, albeit much-needed drenching of rain, which was almost immediately absorbed by the thirsty ground. As storms do, it drove a major influx of birds ahead of it, and the next morning, with the benefit of our experimental nets, our capture rates went through the roof! For three days in a row, we were forced to close nets so as to avoid being overwhelmed by high volumes of Yellow, Tennessee and Yellow-rumped Warblers. Not even the migration nets, which are still lagging behind our new experimental net lanes, were safe, capturing a startlingly large flock of warblers all at once, including an out-of-range Nashville Warbler! They continued to perform surprisingly well throughout the week, capturing a wide variety of warblers and vireos, several more Yellow-bellied Flycatchers, and two Hairy Woodpeckers, one of which was a female that was at least five years old!

For some perspective on just how busy the weeks were in the last week, our four experimental nets alone nearly caught as many birds in six days as our thirteen standard nets caught in the entire spring season. That's a bit of an upgrade!

For those of you wanting some hands-on action with our new influx of birds, our new volunteer portal is now launched and accepting applicants! Banding is an excellent way to get some hands-on experience with wildlife handling and identification, as well as a great thing to show off to your friends about! As another exciting development, we were pleased to formally host our first group of visitors for the fall migration season!
