## Beaverhill Bird Observatory Weekly Update June 20-29, 2022

The staff completed another round of MAPS banding with some exciting captures. A whopping 43 Red-winged Blackbirds were captured, with 19 receiving new bands; the remainder were either already banded or between band sizes, which are processed as usual and released un-banded. Other notable captures include an Eastern Kingbird, a Gray Catbird, 4 Cedar Waxwings, 2 Swamp Sparrows, and 2 stunningly beautiful Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers. A female Common Grackle and a female Ruby-throated Hummingbird were captured but not banded.

Additional to MAPS banding, the staff were occupied with banding nearly 450 Tree Swallow nestlings in the 3 nest box grids. These birds are banded and tracked to better understand site fidelity and migration movements. dispersal, breeding biology and life history

The BBO Purple Martin colony has finally taken off! When staff checked the 2 colony nesting boxes, they found 9 nests – 8 with eggs and 1 with chicks. The staff are delighted to have a breeding colony, and the cheerful bubbly twitters are a welcome addition to the lakeside.

With many thanks to our volunteers, Hazel, Karen, Theodore, and BBO assistant biologists Shane and Jana, the access road repair of the pasture road and Accipiter Alley went smoothly. Bob Schwartz, with his skid steer, did most of the heavy lifting, while the volunteers and staff used rakes and shovels to fine-tune the rest. Thanks to BBO chair Geoff Holroyd for lending a hand and organizing the gravel deliveries.
