Weekly Update October 4-10, 2022

Songbird migration has slowed down significantly this week, and while a few warblers are still trickling through the area our captures this week were mostly composed of our very latest migrating species. We caught an especially high number of American Tree Sparrows, which are

typically the very last songbirds to migrate before winter arrives. Large flocks of geese are continuing to migrate overhead, Tundra Swans have started to migrate as well.

Owl captures remained uncharacteristically low this week much to the

disappointment of the staff. Early October is typically the peak of Northern Saw-whet Owl migration, yet our captures are still lagging well behind previous years. Time will tell whether this is just a delay in owl movement due to warm fall weather or if owl populations are simply lower this year.
