## Beaverhill Bird Observatory Update, July 24<sup>th</sup> to 29<sup>th</sup>, 2012

The final round of MAPS proved to be a busy one for us this year! We are catching a lot of hatch-year birds in varying states of molting; a few still heavily in pins on their body look pretty dishevelled. A few adults that we have caught are also starting to replace their flight feathers.

All of the young birds moving around now means that we had reasonably high capture rates (by MAPS standards), with 20 birds at BLAB, 19 at PARK and 7 at WEIR. Our morning banding at PARK was particularly exciting as most of the captures were in one net, all at the same time! We also spotted an early fall visitor at WEIR when a Myrtle Warbler flitted through the willows by our

Point counts gave us a chance to observe some of the other wildlife in the natural area. I enjoyed watching a female white-tailed deer and her fawn moving through the meadow, and Amélie found a

The staff were also able to go up to the Lesser Slave Lake Bird Observatory (LSLBO) for two mornings of banding. approximately 300 km north of us, migration was much more evidently underway there, with large flocks of warblers moving down the lakeshore on both mornings. It was great to work with Richard Krikun and Nicole Linfoot, who are both extremely knowledgeable, and to band some different bird species. We caught mostly Swainson's Thrushes and Ovenbirds, but also a handful of Black and White Warblers, American Redstarts and Canada Warblers (of course). I was really happy to be able to band a new species, a very scruffy hatch-year Bay-breasted Warbler.
