Beaverhill Bird Observatory Weekly Update May 9th - 15th, 2015

Another interesting week at the BBO. Although catch rates aren't soaring yet, diversity is still quite impressive. As of the 15th we've banded a grand total of **24** species including interesting finds like the Northern Waterthrush, the Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, the Blackpoll Warbler, and the Grey-cheeked Thrush - just to name a few! We're also just shy of the 150th bird caught, with our 100th bird being the very cool Western Palm Warbler. We were also very excited about two Tree Swallow recaptures, which were banded in 2010 and 2012 – making at least one of them five years old!

Low catch rates mean more time for cleaning, organizing, and working on other projects. Steven (our favorite intern) has been working very hard on establishing a breeding bird grid – a project that will allow future interns to survey birds on site and determine information such as bird territory size. The House Wren grid was also inventoried to get it prepared for the season and the interns. Jonathan replaced our previous weighing tubes (fashioned from old TP rolls) with much more high tech plastic pipe (which allows for easier clean-up to prevent the spread of disease between birds).
