## Weekly Update July 9th to July 19th 2017

Round four of MAPS is complete! This round there was a lot of cool captures including a Baltimore Oriole fledgling, lots of young Yellow-Bellied Sapsuckers, Least Flycatchers, Swamp Sparrows, Yellow Warblers, and the first Marsh Wren babies of the season! A total of 134 birds were captured and the weather cooperated for all three banding days, which was a lovely change of pace.

The BBO staff spent two and a half days participating in a Purple Martin Marathon this week! Along with Geoff Holroyd, Glen and Pam Havenegaard, their son Carson, Stephanie and Frida, they travelled around central Alberta, going to landowner's properties, banding their Purple Martin colonies. With the assistance of trap doors, lots of patience, plus scopes/binoculars, they selectively targeted previously banded adult to get the recapture data from them. Afterwards, all martin houses were lowered to the ground and then all nestlings of a suitable age were banded.

Not only did BBO staff and crew band at private properties, but they also went out to the Sherwood Park Fish & Game Association Shooting Range and the Ellis Bird Farm! At the Ellis Bird Farm, they met up with Myrna Pearman, Alishia Richie, Claudia, Sarah, and Jordan who had all the houses preset with trap doors and as one, after the sun had set, they went out and cut all the lines holding the doors open! Lots of fun bird banding in the dark were had by all! Overall, an estimated 500+ birds were banded in those 2.5 days.
